a Germanic paganism worshipping deities associated with nature and war This belief system included human sacrifice and a strong emphasis on fate Wyrð The arrival of Christianity introduced by missionaries like St Augustine in the 6th century grappled with the existing pagan traditions While Christianity gradually gained acceptance pagan beliefs persisted in various forms often intertwining with Christian teachings

4 Influence of the Church The Church played a crucial role in shaping AngloSaxon culture Monasteries became centers of learning and literacy preserving knowledge and promoting education The Church also established courts and wielded considerable political influence shaping the development of AngloSaxon law and social norms

8 thelred the Unready thelred the Unready 968-1016 AD faced a resurgence of Viking raids He was forced to pay Danegeld a tax to the Vikings to avoid further invasions His reign was characterized by political instability and the growing power of the Vikings

9 Beowulf Beowulf though a legendary figure symbolizes the ideal warrior in AngloSaxon society He embodies courage loyalty and strength reflecting the values of a warrior culture
